# TYPE 1 ------> FUTURE POSSIBILITY

TYPE 1

IF CLAUSE

MAIN CLAUSE

IF + SIMPLE PRESENT TENSE ( SUBJECT+ V, ) FUTURE TENSE ( SUBJECT + WILL + V, )

### USING TYPE 1 IN ENGLISH:

Type 1 is used to express a possibility in the future (It is not certain that it will happen, but it is possible) or when talking about real and possible situations in the future.

#### EXAMPLES:

 If I have enough money, I will buy a car.
 If you work hard, you will win the prize.

 If I go to the market, I will buy what you want.
 If I am not busy, I will help you.



# TYPE 2 ------ PRESENT UNREAL

### USING TYPE 2 IN ENGLISH:

If Clauses – Type 2 is used to express dreams, unreal situations and things that are unlikely to happen.

#### EXAMPLES:

- □ If I had money, I would give you.
- □ If I didn't smoke, I would be healty.
- If it didn't rain, we would go on a picnic.
   If I were you, I would want to be a doctor.



SC

If you work hard, (Subordinate clause) (simple present)

(MC) Main clause

you will not pass in the examination (Simple Future)

If you work hard, you will pass in the examination

If I had an opportunity, I would complete the work.

Buy bought bought

Had gone

Had told

Had informed

### If you had informed me,

I would have picked you up in the railway station.
